



What to do in an emergency ...

Basic information and recommendations for action in the event of a chemical accident.

How will I get information?

- From PA announcements
- From radio and television bulletins
- From the NINA app

What should I do first?

1. I go to a closed, above-ground room, i.e. *not* a basement.
2. I close all doors and windows.
I switch off the ventilation or air conditioning.
The same applies if I am in my car.
3. I bring children playing outdoors into the house.
4. I inform neighbors and passers-by.
I take in any passers-by.

Closed rooms provide effective initial protection against gases and the effects of explosions.

What should I do next?

1. I keep away from the scene of the accident and do not do anything on my own initiative. Instead, I wait for notifications from the responsible authorities and follow their instructions.
2. I switch on the radio:
WDR II 87.8 MHz
(cable frequency 95.95 or 90.00 MHz),
Antenne Unna 102.3 MHz
(cable frequency 93.95 or 87.70 MHz)

What else should I do?

1. Avoid open flames (no smoking!).
2. If I notice any odors, I hold a damp cloth over my mouth and nose to avoid inhaling toxic substances.

What should I not do under any circumstances?

1. I avoid using the telephone to make inquiries so that the lines remain free. They are needed by the emergency personnel.
2. I do not leave the house unless requested to do so as I would be placing myself in danger. The access routes are required by the emergency forces.
